Information about COVID-19 Vaccination in Powys

Update for Stakeholders - 23 April 2021

Dear Colleagues

Yesterday we reached 125,000 vaccine doses in Powys, and over three quarters of the adult population have already received their first dose. This means that we have exceeded our goal to offer everyone aged 50+ their first dose by the middle of April, and already over 12,000 people under 50 have had the vaccine.


We are also continuing with our daily updates on our website but have now moved to a fortnightly edition of this bulletin.



Here are some of the key headlines this week:

- Across the UK we continue to be affected by the expected period of reduced supplies. This does mean that we are providing first doses at a slower pace than the peak we saw earlier this month, but second doses are not affected.
- Anyone aged 40 and over can use our Priority Access Form to let us know if you
 have not received your first dose, and our team will fast-track you to an
 appointment: Priority Access Forms Powys Teaching Health Board (nhs.wales)
- Anyone aged 30-39 can join our reserve list, and there is also a secondary reserve list for people aged 18-29: <u>Reserve Lists - Powys Teaching Health Board</u> (nhs.wales)

- If you receive an invitation and wish to decline vaccination, or wish to cancel the
 appointment you have been offered and arrange a new one, then please let us
 know by contacting the booking hub (the telephone number is in your letter) or

- We are following the very latest guidance on AstraZeneca. There was an update in our last newsletter and we now also have a dedicated page on our website with the latest FAQs and links to more detailed information. Based on national guidance people aged 18-29 should be offered an alternative to AstraZeneca if available so this does mean that you may see 18-29 called from the reserve list if Pfizer slots become available: Your questions about the Oxford AstraZeneca Vaccine Powys Teaching Health Board (nhs.wales)
- With updated guidance now available from the JCVI on vaccination pregnancy we also have a dedicated section of our website for pregnant women: <u>COVID-19</u> <u>Vaccination, Pregnancy and Breastfeeding - Powys Teaching Health Board</u> (nhs.wales)
- As mentioned above, second dose appointments are not affected by the change in supplies. Already nearly a third of the adult population in Powys has received their second dose. If you do not receive an invitation for a second dose appointment 11-12 weeks after your first dose then you can contact us and we will fast-track you to an appointment: <u>Second Dose Appointments - Powys</u> <u>Teaching Health Board (nhs.wales)</u>
- More than 94% of people in Priority Groups 1-9 have already received their first dose, and over 40% have double dose protection. This also means that nearly 75% of the total adult population in Powys have had their first vaccination. The graph below shows the overall uptake in the county.



This week in our "Vaccination Heroes" series we focused on the new immunisers who have joined our team.



When we started vaccination back in December we brought in vaccinators from across the health board workforce. However, as we move forward we have been able to recruit and train new vaccinators to deliver the COVID vaccine.

Some of these are retired staff who are coming back to help, and others are health care support workers who are keen to develop their skills and careers.

Eira Meyer is a Health Care Support Worker, normally working in Newtown hospital. She explained "I already wanted to train to become a nurse, so this was the perfect opportunity for me to gain some amazing experience and to help out with the vaccination programme. It's been great being part of the team and helping the community."

Sue Evans is a Health Care Support Worker in Bronllys. She told me "I used to be a nurse but my registration ran out while I was working abroad. Coming back into the health service has been great for me and I've really enjoyed helping the people that come through for vaccination. The support has been great and I and the other HCSWs training to be vaccinators are so glad to be accepted."

In rural areas like Powys it is really important to be able to 'grow our own' staff. The health board has a programme dedicated to supporting people to become registered nurses and other health professionals. Whether they join as Apprentices or as Health Care Support Workers, there is a pathway to a career in the NHS in Powys.

Thank you to everyone that is part of this amazing process.

It is important to remember that we remain at Alert Level 4 in Wales. Coronavirus continues to circulate. There is good evidence that the vaccine prevents serious illness from COVID-19, but we all need to assume that we can catch the virus and transmit it even if we have had the vaccine.

Hands, Face, Space, Fresh Air remain vital messages to protect ourselves and our loved ones.

Coronavirus Testing now available for a wider set of symptoms in Powys

Everyone in Powys can already have a free coronavirus test if you have one of the three classic signs: fever, a new continuous cough or a loss/change of taste and smell.

But now you can now also go for a free Coronavirus test if you have a wider range of symptoms. These are:

- Flu-like symptoms including any or all of: aches or pains; tiredness; headache; runny nose or blocked nose; sneezing; sore throat; shortness of breath; nausea; loss of appetite; diarrhoea or vomiting.
- Generally feeling unwell or have been in contact with a known COVID-19 case.
- Any new or change in symptoms following a previous negative test.

The widening of symptoms is to help find hidden COVID-19 cases in our communities, and drive down the numbers of onward transmissions. Ensuring effective and accessible testing for a wider range of signs and symptoms will help control and stop the virus from spreading further in our Powys communities.

Residents are therefore encouraged to get a test if they are experiencing any symptoms such as the above that are new, persistent and/or unusual for them. The more tests are carried out, the easier it will be to spot early clusters of cases and possible virus mutations.

People who are experiencing one or more of the three classic symptoms of a fever, a new continuous cough or a loss/change of taste and smell must continue to follow Welsh Government guidance by going for a test and self-isolating with their household whilst they await a test result.

People who take a test because of the new wider symptoms listed above, they are not required to isolate while they await their test result. This includes school pupils who can continue to attend school while they await their test result.

People who have had any of the classic signs or any of the new wider symptoms and would like to book a test can do so online at www.gov.wales/getting-tested-coronavirus-covid-19 or by calling 119, or 18001 119 for people with hearing or speech difficulties. This is also the way to request a home testing kit.

As these are national testing centres, you may automatically be asked about the classic three signs. However, simply choose either option: "you have been asked to take a test by your local council" or "you are part of a government pilot project" to book your test.

However, if you are chasing your COVID-19 result, you will need to call 119. Results can take up to 72 hours for processing.

Access Lateral Flow Devices if you are not able to work from home

Welsh Government has put in place new arrangements so that tests for people who do not have symptoms - **Lateral Flow Devices** – are available for people who are not able to work from home (including volunteers). The devices can be collected every morning from the testing centres in Newtown and Brecon. We expect the collection points to expand in future and will share more details as we receive them.
